Salt, Slavery and Cheshire.



Mark Bevan, left, local author and historian, seen here with Tom Hughes, gave us a thoughtprovoking talk on Tuesday 17th May about the influence and effects of international trade. He started his talk with pictures of some of the grand historic houses in the Cheshire area. His premise was that all the wealthy traders originally made their money from the three way trade of salt to Africa, slaves to America and goods we needed, such as cotton and sugar, back to Liverpool. He stated that all trading consisted of very complicated links, and therefore, all great wealth undoubtedly must have included slavery at some point in the mists of time.



Blackden Trust Visits

We had the delight of the author. Alan Garner. OBE and winner of many distinguished literary prizes and awards, himself, showing us around his home and the Medicine House. Alan stood up to introduce himself and his wife, Griselda, and explain how they came to be living there, and we were all spellbound within two minutes! It is from this amazing site that he has had his inspirations for his books such as The Weirdstone of Brisingamen, The Moon of Gomrath, The Owl Service which was made into a TV series, and many others.

Cheshire Churches and Minstrels.

Tom Hughes kindly stepped into the breach for a speaker unable to attend on Tuesday 14th June. He talked about the history of the Minstrel's Court, which was a tradition from the 12th Century, that has been revived. This Minstrels Court now takes place in St John the Baptist's Church in Chester, usually in mid June. It was traditionally how medieval musicians, storytellers and performers got their

licenses to perform. Tom linked this to of icons minstrels to be found in several churches in



the area. As he showed a photograph of each icon from a local church, he was able to produce a replica instrument and give us a superb musical demonstration as to how they worked and sounded.

Norton Priory Visit.

We had an excellent guided tour around the gardens and priory ruins. We were given the history of both the Priory itself and the later

house, and shown the various parts of the garden. As you can see, a glorious day and, if I am completely honest, a slightly over-



grown garden in places!

Nine Lives. On Tuesday 13th September Janet Bradshaw gave us a fascinating talk about nine different characters to be found on the Tatton Estate throughout its history. As you will have read in the local newspaper and on our website, 'Congratulations' must go to all the Weaver Hall Museum and Workhouse staff. The Friends already knew it, but the museum is officially recognised again by Visit England, the tourism authority, as a first class venue.

The Weaver Hall Museum has been rewarded with another Rosette from the Visitor Attraction Quality Assurance Scheme (VAQAS) at Visit England.
