Recent Events



The Salt Museum played host to the Cheshire Best Kept Station Competition on the January 22. Felicity Goodey, former BBC journalist and now taking the role of Chair of the Steering Group directing Cheshire's Year of Gardens, was guest of honour. Over 90 people, including six mayors and the Chairman of the County Council attended this high profile function and the event provided an excellent opportunity to promote the Salt Museum, as guests were free to wander and view the galleries.

30 January saw the Salt Museum host another popular event attracting over 88 members of the River Weaver Navigation Society. A member of our own 'Friends', Colin Edmondson, gave an illustrated talk about the heritage sites along part of the River Weaver. Colin recently featured on the BBC 'Countryfile' programme which was dedicated to salt and the Northwich & Winsford areas. Matt, our curator, lent the BBC film from the archive and aided their research. Colin has agreed to talk to us later in the year – watch this space!



The launch of the Lancashire & Cheshire Photographic Union Centenary Exhibition took place early in January. To go with this exhibition on February 13 David Marsh, past President of the Union, gave a talk to 22 people in the Regalette. He told us stories about the personalities and characters who developed techniques to improve and popularise photography. It was a fascinating history. He also showed us famous images from some of their work. These images were superb and illustrated David's points very well. Many of these images are to be found in the celebratory centenary booklet he prepared, which is on sale in the Salt Museum at £2 each.

A Talk with Jenny Tyson.

Jenny took over the role of Chair of The Friends, following the retirement of Murray Jones, who is moving south to be closer to family.

Ed: Jenny, how long have you been associated with the Friends?

Jenny: I have been a member since the very beginning, when the Friends were first created.

Ed: Can you tell us a bit about yourself?

Jenny: I was born in Sevenoaks in Kent and moved to Cheshire when I got married. When I became Head of the Geography department at Hartford High School, I was totally fascinated by the geography and history of the Northwich area and its underlying geology. The development and prosperity of the town is all linked to salt. I wanted to ensure the pupils understood the uniqueness of their heritage. To that end I developed a unit of work that encouraged the pupils and their parents to visit the Salt Museum. This was the start of my links with the Salt Museum.

Ed: How did you feel when you were asked to become Chair? Jenny: If I am honest, a bit daunted. Ed: Now you've settled in are there any changes you would like to see in the way Friends operate?

Jenny: Yes! I'd like the Friends to get to know each other better. I'd like us <u>all</u> to help promote the Salt Museum and celebrate all the events organised by Matt and his team.

Ed: You've been arranging trips for the Friends, can you tell us about them?

Jenny: Yes! As you know it's Cheshire's Year Of Gardens and so we have arranged a tour of Mount Pleasant Gardens at Kelsall, for June 3. There are more details on a separate flyer.

We have also arranged a coach trip on Tuesday, September 16 to the National Memorial Arboretum and to Lichfield City. We do hope you will be able to join us on this and future 'Away days'.

Curators Corner



The Salt Museum has made two new, interesting acquisitions. A **Victorian funeral bier** has been acquired to link into the plans to develop the information about the workhouse. Matt and his team are going to build up the information

about the workhouse. You might spot information boards appearing in different rooms soon. Keep looking! The other acquisition is a **very rare postcard** published by the 1924 Mount Everest team - Cheshire born George Mallory died whilst attempting to conquer the mountain. This might appear in a special exhibition. Watch this space!

Let there be light! Matt has had his prayers answered. Cheshire County Council has invested in a completely **new lighting system** in the Salt Museum to replace the old and in many cases defunct one. You should now be able to see every exhibit with total clarity! In the next few months you should also see improvements on the outside of the Salt Museum. The local authority is cleaning all the gutters, even of the tower, and then **painting** all the windows and doors. This should really improve this lovely Grade II listed building and keep it water tight for the future.
