Forthcoming Events

On 11 June we have an evening talk on 'Cheshire's Lowland Search and Rescue Service' by Ray Milne. They are based in Warrington, handy for access to major motorways M6, M56 & M62. They have a website at http://www.cheshire-sarteam.org/

The exhibition was literally opened to a fanfare by our own Roman visitors, who added greatly to the atmosphere and were much in demand for photos and chats on life in Roman Britain.



Our tenth anniversary celebrations in February were a success, with appearances by Matt and Jenny on Cheshire FM and ten memberships given away to the first two visitors each day for one week.

The night started with Friends gathering for a chat in the coffee shop before moving in to the Board Of Guardians' room where they were greeted by John Hulme who provided the drinks for the night.



Jenny, our chair, gave a formal toast to the Friends past and future successes and then we enjoyed a piece of birthday cake, baked by a fellow Friend and cut by some of our founding members.



A presentation of the 'Birds of Cheshire and Wirral' was made by David Cogger to Matt, who accepted it on behalf of the museum. We were then given a guided tour to places not normally open - not even on the museum open days!

Our March Talk was by **David Hayns**, who gave a talk on
'Cheshire's Changing
Boundaries.'



A topic that was relevant given the changes in local government within Cheshire. David showed us a variety of slides combining old and present day maps; documentary evidence and extracts; and his own photographs tracing Cheshire's county border.

He tracked the boundary in the landscape and on the ground, and delving through woods and undergrowth in order to find his evidence. He searched for the junction of the three counties of Cheshire, Shropshire and Staffordshire, which were marked by the confluence of three streams. David found that boundary stones

had disappeared and others had been used in the fabric of buildings.

Unusual place names, such as Bumpers Lane in Chester, were now easily understood after David explained the ceremony of 'beating the bounds.' An interesting talk that showed David's love of history and natural scenery, which was enjoyed by all who attended.

On 15 April twenty-one of the Friends gathered at **Stretton Watermill** on a morning



threatening thunderstorms and heavy rain showers. Luckily the weatherman was wrong and although quite chilly it remained dry. We were split into two groups, one starting inside the mill and the other looking at the outside.

The mill itself has been there for many, many years and some of the original features still remain despite being renovated in the late 1700s. The process itself is fascinating; more so because we are looking at ancient crafts that have withstood the tests of time. The methods may have originated with the Saxons but today such an environmentally friendly process is startlingly relevant.

It was interesting to learn that the mill intends to harness the power to produce a small amount of electricity that will enable it to be self-



sufficient. The millers were friendly, helpful and knowledgeable and made our visit a very enjoyable

one and I would thoroughly recommend a visit to any Friends unable to join us on the day.

Afterwards thirteen of us went to the Cock O' Barton for a pub lunch. We were dining in style in our own private room! The food was excellent and the company even more so. All in all an extremely enjoyable experience.

R' We S'D'frnt - My Weekend exhibition, curated by Michael Troy of Connexions, was

Cheshire Best Kept Stations - where everyone is a winner!

The 20th of January 2009 was a big night at the Salt Museum, when at the awards Evening of Cheshire Best Kept Stations, Chelford Railway Station was declared Cheshire's Best Kept Station.



Way back in 2003 John Hulme, who is an active member of the Friends Committee and used to run his business at Plumley Station, decided to start a little competition to raise the standard of the local railway stations. Over the years the competition has grown in size and stature, and was hotly contested by over twenty stations this year. Points are awarded in such a way that a station planted by local groups has as much chance as one funded by a large railway operator, and judges make surprise visits over the course of the year.

An idea of the standing of the competition can be judged by the list of attendees; six mayors, the Chairman of the County Council and the Sheriff

of Chester joined over 90 other guests in congratulating the villagers of Chelford on their success. As John said, "The local volunteers in Chelford have transformed their small village station. With little to start with, the station is now tended on a daily basis by those in the Community. They were last year nominated for a national award. This evening they are Cheshire's Best Kept Station." In the spirit of Cheshire Best Kept Station, the villagers were supported by Northern Rail, ISS, Marshalls, AJN Landscapes, Chelford Farm Supplies and Chelford Parish Council.

Awards were also made to Crewe, Delamere, Frodsham, Helsby, Holmes Chapel, Knutsford, Nantwich, Neston and Wilmslow Railway Stations. On presenting the Awards, Chris Brown



thanked all those who had helped make Cheshire's Stations more hospitable, tidier, and welcoming. He reported that Cheshire's Year of the Gardens o8 - which was the focus of 2008 Awards - had been a great success and had made a significant contribution to the increase in the visitor economy. The task now was to sustain everyone's hard work into 2009 and beyond.

A big thanks to John, who puts a great deal of time and hard work into the project, and to all who supported him in his endeavours.

Curator's Corner



Another busy period at the museum what with the end of the financial year, the end of the county council

and the opening of a new exhibition. The museum service is now part of the new authority, Cheshire West & Chester. This means that our two sites, the Salt Museum and Stretton Watermill, have joined forces with the Grosvenor Museum in Chester and the Lion Salt Works. We will be exploring ways in which we can work more closely together over the coming months. We hope we can create a dynamic portfolio of museums that everyone in West Cheshire can be justly proud of. As you are no doubt aware, we have plans to re-develop the Salt Museum as the museum exploring the wider history of the mid / west Cheshire area. This is the direction in which we've been moving over last few years and will give the Lion Salt Works scope to develop as the main saltrelated attraction for the area. At Stretton Watermill, we have plans to improve the access at the rear exit of the mill and also introduce a low-key scheme to generate electricity using the power of the water wheels.

On 30 April, 94 guests came to the Salt Museum for the preview of our WW2 exhibition, 'Northwich at War - the Home Front'. This has been a fascinating project to put together and we were delighted that so many people came forward and answered our appeal for artefacts, photos and memories. We have assembled an array of original artefacts relating to air raids, evacuation, the blackout and rationing. We interviewed around 15 people with vivid memories of various aspects of the war years. Most allowed us to film them as well as record with sound equipment their memories. This can be a daunting experience for the interviewee so I was very grateful that the majority allowed us to do this and I hope it enhances the film. We also interviewed Dr Arthur Townsend, a member of the friends and a museum volunteer, who provided us with a compelling account of his time as a child in London. Although, his experiences differ greatly from those of the Cheshire residents, we felt it was important to make this recording to share with others. The final result is a film lasting 2 hours 19 minutes. We showed a 30 minute extract at the preview which was well received. You can find out more about the exhibition by coming along to our 'Tea & a Talk' on 24 June when I will talking in more detail about the project. I will be joined by local author, Paul Hurley, who will talk about what might have happened to Britain if Hitler and Germany had won the war.

We are now working on our programme for the second half of the year. Exhibitions to look forward to include a display of work by French artists from Mornant (the twin town of Hartford), 'Art by Chips' a display by Northwich Photographic Society and an exhibition exploring the lives and achievements of Andrew Irvine and George Mallory, Cheshire's infamous mountaineers. We will also be organising more holiday activities and another monthly programme of film shows in 'The Regalette'. We now have an air-conditioning unit installed in the cinema so we hope to keep you cool during the summer months that's if we get a nice summer this year! We look forward to seeing you all at one of these events.
